### INTRODUCTION

Attached for your review is an update of the Statement of Financial Activities for the 2nd Quarter, the Aging of Accounts Receivable and Payable Reports and State Fair Revenue Report.

### Annual Audit Progress:

We have been in active communication with our independent auditors and are in the audit process for fiscal year end 2020. Once the 2020 fiscal year audit has concluded, we will begin the 2021 fiscal year audit.

The independent auditor firm, Richardson, LLP, is contracted with a term of January 1, 2021 to December 31, 2023, with an option to extend for an additional two (2) one-year terms. The Board decided in 2021 to combine the audits for both 2020 and 2021 as a result of Cal Expo's transition from events to COVID emergency response. The term of the auditor agreement will expire at the end of 2023. We are in the process of amending the current contract exercising our option to extend the term for an additional year to perform the 2022 fiscal year end audit.

### 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter Statement of Financial Activities:

On January 1, 2023, Cal Expo became the owner of the Multi-Use Sports Facility. Revenue generated by the facility appears in row 3 of the report. At the end of  $2^{nd}$ 

Quarter, the revenue generated through a combination of events held at the facility totals \$347,913. This represents an approximate 47% increase in revenue for Cal Expo. For a comparison, in the past 7 (seven) fiscal years, Cal Expo averaged \$162,339 annually in facility rent from its prior facility manager.

Our events team has booked more events at Cal Expo between January and June 2023. As shown in line 2 on the report, the combination of these events shows an increase in revenue of approximately 60%. This has surpassed the total amount at this same point in any of the prior 7 (seven) fiscal years.

### Annual State Fair:

The accounting and contracts staffs were hard at work preparing for the 2023 California State Fair from January 2023 up until the first day of the fair. I would like to take a moment to commend all staff on the work they have done and continue to do to wrap up and close out the contracts and accounts related to the business of the annual state fair.

Our Accounting staff reviewed State Fair related accounting processes, and developed a streamlined processes to provide for less duplicative steps in recording information into our accounting software system. This resulted in the ability to have the preliminary State Fair Revenue report before you today. Please note, the bank reconciliation process for August 2023 is still underway, therefore these are preliminary figures until the reconciliation work has concluded.

Despite the unexpected heat wave at the beginning of the 2023 Annual State Fair, there were some areas worth noting that finished strong.

### A few highlights of interest:

- Gold Circle Seating for 2023 was the highest (almost double) in comparison to other CA State Fairs since 2015
- Concert merchandise sold in 2023 was the highest (almost double) in comparison to other CA State Fairs since 2015
- Food and Beverage Concessions commissions was average compared to other CA State Fairs since 2015
- Food and Beverage OVG was at par compared to other CA State Fairs since 2015
- 2023 Trailer Space was the highest compared to other CA State Fairs since 2015

### **High Points**

With an unprecedented month of extreme heat across the world, it was no exception that the Sacramento Region also set records. Meteorologist were forecasting weather often in the 110–112-degree range and asking the community to "Stay home and be safe," it was tough to entice guests to come to the fair during the first two weekends. Attendance was negatively impacted. It was during this lull, that staff made the decision to open up ticket sales on GroupOn to help encourage attendance at a discount.

This heat also created a concern for the safety of the horses scheduled to race. With the horse's safety in mind, the decision was made by CARF to cancel State Fair Horse Racing on the first weekend.

As the heat subsided in the evenings in the second week of fair, the crowds grew in size. They enjoyed all of the exhibits, livestock, displays and entertainment, including the enhanced lineup on the Golden 1 Stage. The Toyota concert series featured many artists not seen at State Fair in a while resulting in sold out crowds.

Key factors to great concert turnouts were the social media posts and traditional media stories. Traditional media was dominated by live broadcasts from CBS 13, KCRA 3, ABC 10 and Telemundo. Their focus was on the concerts, food vendors, carnival rides, Cavalcade of Horses, Dragons and Chief Walton. Chief Walton was interviewed many times regarding the newly revised Minor Policy. Radio was on-site a number of days and Radio DJ's provided live interviews with fair goers and vendors promoting the fair or products. Many of the DJ's were on hand to give the introduction for the evening's featured concert band/artist as well.

The social media blitz by staff reached a large audience throughout the entire state. Adding to the social media content provided by the Fair there were large social media screens placed throughout the fairgrounds. The screens were used to broadcast images and content posted by users who used the correct hashtags. This interaction helped elevate the CA State Fair to be the 6<sup>th</sup> most socially active fair in the United States; as reported by Travel Daily Media.

Other entertainment venues like Heart Health Park and the Rodeo Arena saw good crowds. Sac Republic Football Club hosted 2 games during State Fair and there was a concert featuring a band called Falling in Reverse. The Rodeo Arena featured monster trucks and a destruction derby for the gear heads. A Lucha Extreme wresting event and Gran Jaripeo were also highly attended at the Rodeo Arena.

Complimented by the large number of strolling artists, staged performances and specialty acts, the 2023 California State Fair was an entertainment mecca with large crowds over the last 4 days of Fair who took advantage of the cooler temperatures.

Coping with challenges outside of our control, staff pulled together to help create a successful fair that everyone can be proud of. Many of the new staff, after going through their first year, have already started to work on improvements and changes to the procedures and processes used to ensure all of the programs for Fair continue to grow.

The July 12-28, 2024 California State Fair Dates are presented to the Board for Approval.

### **History of the Dates**

The California State Fair moved its dates from August to July in 2009. There were concerns that the August Fair dates were limiting the availability of the youth to attend fair during the school year. This date change was made in conjunction with entertainment, vendors and the carnival all making adjustments.

### **Current Dates**

The current date structure of the California State Fair has the fair's closing weekend on the final full weekend of July. This date structure allows the Fair to encompass the entire second half of July each year.

Many stakeholders, including the carnival company and food vendors, start working on their event schedule a year in advance. As such, they plan their routes around the annual California State Fair as it is a major, if not, their highest revenue event of their Fair season.

### RECOMMENDATION

Subject: Northern California Horse Racing - Informational Only

This agenda item provides information on the impending closing of Golden Gate Fields (GGF), which is owned by The Stronach Group. Since the unexpected announcement by GGF to close, the horse racing industry stakeholders have been seeking a solution which will allow for the continuation of thoroughbred horse racing in Northern California. Without a coordinated plan, or extension of horse racing at GGF, thoroughbred racing is facing an uncertain future.

Because the situation is evolving, this item may be continued to the Board's October study session, should new information become available, or an agreement be reached between industry stakeholders.

### **CLOSING OF GOLDEN GATE FIELDS**

On July 16, 2023, The Stronach Group abruptly announced the closure of the 82-year-old Golden Gate Fields horse racing facility. GGF straddles the cities of Albany and Berkeley. The company initially announced its intention to shut down operations at the end of the year in order to focus on racing at Santa Anita in Southern California. The California Authority of Racing Fairs (CARF), as well as members of the California Horse Racing Board (CHRB) have inquired about the feasibility of Cal Expo serving as a potential home for those desiring to continue racing in Northern California. Any effort to do so would rely on the coordination of Northern California racetracks and collaboration with Watch & Wager, LLC (W&W).

To keep GGF open another six months, through Spring 2024, the California State Legislature overwhelmingly approved Assembly Bill 1074 in the last week of the 2023 Legislative Session.

The bill would allow simulcast money from Northern California to be sent to Southern California after July 1, 2024 but only when or if Northern California does not host live racing. In exchange, The Stronach Group will keep Golden Gate Fields open through next spring. AB 1074 is attached for your perusal.

The bill, written by Assembly Democrat Miguel Santiago and Senate Democrat Bill Dodd, was introduced by Assembly Republican Juan Alanis. It awaits Governor Newsom's signature.

### HORSE RACING HISTORY

The Cal Expo racetrack hosts racing meets almost year-round, with special attention paid to the live thoroughbred horse racing during the annual California State Fair. The track opened to the public in 1968 and has a one-mile oval track with a 990-foot homestretch. It houses approximately 1,100 stalls in the backstretch area. The racetrack also provides for nighttime racing year-round. The racetrack and grandstand (The Miller Lite Grandstand) has an occupancy of 20,000 people and includes the Cal Expo Sports & Wagering Center, which features a Sports Bar and Clubhouse on the second floor. A Turf Club is housed on the top floor and includes outside table dining.

Thoroughbred horse racing during the California State Fair dates back to 1855 and takes place on weekends. Harness racing takes place from November to April and is coordinated by Watch & Wager. The Cal Expo racetrack was specifically built for horseracing.

### Watch & Wager

In August of 2012, Cal Expo entered into a Revenue Generating Agreement with W&W to operate a harness meet at Cal Expo. The term of the Agreement was originally August 2012 through May 2017. The Agreement included an option to extend, yet no specific extension period was outlined. In May of 2016, the Board extended the contract with W&W to May of 2022. Then in September of 2019 the Board approved another contract extension through May 1, 2025. Contract extensions were tied to financial enhancements provided to Cal Expo by W&W.

In May of 2022, the Board extended the contract with W&W through May 2030. In consideration of this extension, W&W is proposed to pay higher rental rates as follows:

- 1) Effective May 1, 2022, the new rate would be \$2,500 per race day (an increase from the earlier \$1,800 per race day rate.)
- 2) Effective May 1, 2025, the new rate would be \$3,000 per race day.

**Note:** W&W operates the only harness racing meet west of the Mississippi, which runs roughly 50 days.

Currently, Section 34 of the Agreement provides Cal Expo with an option to cancel with six months' notice, should Cal Expo choose not to use its premises for live horseracing. The language reads as follows:

In the event that Cal Expo determines by official action of its Board that it no longer intends to use the Premises for horseracing, Cal Expo shall have the option to terminate the Agreement by delivery of a six-month termination notice. Such notice shall be

provided no later than the last race day of the harness meet ending in that calendar year, in which case the Agreement shall terminate on the last race day of the harness meet ending the following calendar year.

All other terms of the earlier Agreement remained the same.

Over the past 10 years W&W has partnered with Cal Expo on several projects to improve the racetrack and the backstretch. Some of these projects include:

- Track maintenance and improvement (grading, chemical testing)
- New inside racing rail
- Backstretch access control
- Backstretch increased surveillance and security
- Contributed more than \$100,000 to upgrade satellite equipment in the Grandstand to HD
- Annual loan of W&W track equipment to Cal Expo to help prepare Cal Expo's Horse Arena & Rodeo Arena for use

An act to amend Sections 19531 and 19605.52 of the Business and Professions Code, relating to horse racing.

### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1074, Alanis. Horse racing.

The Horse Racing Law vests the California Horse Racing Board with jurisdiction and supervision over horse racing meetings in the state. The Horse Racing Law requires the board to issue licenses to associations and fairs that participate in horse racing meetings with parimutuel wagering and to allocate racing dates to those associations and fairs in accordance with that law. The Horse Racing law authorizes the board to issue a license to an association or a fair to conduct a horse racing meeting in accordance with its provisions at the track specified in the written application, as specified. Under the Horse Racing Law, the board may allocate racing weeks to an applicant, subject to specified limitations, and specify the racing days, dates, and hours for horse racing meetings that will be in the public interest and will subserve the purposes of that law. The Horse Racing Law requires the board to make allocations of racing weeks as it deems appropriate and specifies the maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated for horse racing other than at fairs, including, for thoroughbred racing, a maximum of 44 weeks per year of racing weeks in the northern zone and a maximum of 49 weeks per year in the combined central and southern zones.

If the board does not license a thoroughbred race meet to be conducted by a racing association at a racetrack located in a specified location in the northern zone after July 1, 2024, this bill would deem a thoroughbred racing association, or racing fair, licensed to meet in the southern or central zone to be operating in the northern zone during certain racing weeks for the purpose of conducting all permissible forms of wagering in the northern zone and making and receiving required distributions from those wagers. The bill would require mandatory distributions to be made in accordance with requirements applicable to the northern zone, as specified, and would require amounts generated for purses and

commissions to be distributed in accordance with prescribed requirements.

The Horse Racing Law authorizes the board to permit fairs to operate satellite wagering facilities at their fairgrounds, under certain conditions. In addition, the Horse Racing Law permits any fair in the Counties of Kern or Shasta, with the approval of the Department of Food and Agriculture and the authorization of the board, to operate one satellite wagering facility within the boundaries of the fair, as specified.

This bill would permit any fair in the County of Stanislaus, with the approval of the Department of Food and Agriculture and the authorization of the board, to operate one satellite wagering facility within the boundaries of the fair, on the same conditions as apply in the Counties of Kern and Shasta.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 19531 of the Business and Professions Code is amended to read:

- 19531. (a) The board shall make allocations of racing weeks, including simultaneous racing between zones, as it deems appropriate. The maximum number of racing weeks that may be allocated for horse racing other than at fairs, shall be as follows:
- (1) For thoroughbred racing: 44 weeks per year in the northern zone; and 49 weeks per year in the combined central and southern zones.
  - (2) For harness racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone.
- (3) For quarter horse racing: 25 weeks per year in the northern zone.
- (4) For harness racing and quarter horse racing: a total of 77 weeks per year in the combined central and southern zones.
- (b) In its written application for a license, an applicant shall state the time of day, consistent with this chapter, during which it will conduct its racing meeting, and particularly the first race starting time for the various racing days. After receiving a license, a licensee shall not change the first race starting time without securing prior approval of the board.
- (c) Notwithstanding this section or any other provision in this chapter, the following provisions apply:

- (1) From the weeks available in the combined central and southern zones pursuant to subdivision (a), the board shall allocate a minimum of seven weeks per year to a thoroughbred racing association to conduct thoroughbred racing at a racetrack that was used to conduct a thoroughbred race meeting in the southern zone prior to 2012.
- (2) The board shall not allocate dates to a thoroughbred association in the central zone for the purpose of conducting racing if a thoroughbred racing association is conducting racing in the southern zone on the same date during daytime hours.
- (3) From the weeks available in the combined central and southern zones pursuant to subdivision (a), the board shall allocate a minimum of 25 weeks per year to a thoroughbred racing association to conduct thoroughbred racing at a racetrack that was used to conduct a thoroughbred race meeting in the central zone prior to 2012.
- (4) The board shall not allocate dates to a thoroughbred association in the southern zone for the purpose of conducting racing if a thoroughbred racing association is conducting racing in the central zone on the same date during daytime hours.
- (5) From the weeks available in the combined central and southern zones pursuant to subdivision (a), the board may allocate a maximum of five weeks per year to a thoroughbred racing association to conduct thoroughbred racing at a racetrack in the southern zone that was not used to conduct a thoroughbred race meeting in the southern zone prior to 2012.
- (d) (1) Notwithstanding any other law, if the board does not license a thoroughbred race meet to be conducted by a racing association at a racetrack located in the cities of Berkeley and Albany after July 1, 2024, a thoroughbred racing association, or racing fair, in the southern or central zone licensed by the board to conduct a thoroughbred race meet or fair meet shall, during racing weeks not allocated by the board for a race meet in the northern zone, be deemed to be operating in the northern zone for the purpose of conducting all permissible forms of wagering in the northern zone pursuant to this chapter and making and receiving required distributions from those wagers in accordance with this chapter.
- (2) Required distributions described in paragraph (1) shall be made in accordance with the requirements applicable to a racing

association in the northern zone and any consent or approval rights shall be exercised by the appropriate racing association or racing fair in the central or southern zone conducting racing.

- (3) The amounts generated for purses and commissions pursuant to this subdivision shall be used to pay simulcast funding requirements and board support that the thoroughbred racing associations and racing fair in the central or southern zones are required to make under Section 19616.51. Any remaining funds after those payments are made shall be distributed to each thoroughbred racing association and racing fair in the central and southern zone proportionally based on their respective handle in the central and southern zone during the previous fiscal year and that money shall be divided between purses and commissions in the same relative proportion as was generated in the central and southern zone during the previous fiscal year.
- SEC. 2. Section 19605.52 of the Business and Professions Code is amended to read:
- 19605.52. Notwithstanding subdivision (a) of Section 19605, and Section 19605.1, any fair in the Counties of Kern, Shasta, or Stanislaus may, with the approval of the Department of Food and Agriculture and the authorization of the board, subject to the conditions specified in Section 19605.3, operate one satellite wagering facility within the boundaries of that fair.
